MARSY'S LAW

As the victim of crime, you are provided these rights: https://oag.ca.gov/victimservices/content/bill_of_rights

- 1. To be treated with fairness and respect throughout the criminal justice process.
- 2. To be reasonably protected from the defendant and persons acting on behalf of the defendant.
- 3. To have the safety of the victim and the victim's family considered in fixing the amount of bail and release conditions for the defendant.
- **4.** To prevent the disclosure of confidential information or records to the defendant.
- **5.** To refuse an interview, deposition, or discovery request by the defendant.
- **6.** To reasonable notice of and to reasonably confer with the prosecuting agency regarding the arrest (if known), charges filed, extradition, and pretrial disposition.
- 7. To reasonable notice of all public proceedings.
- 8. To be heard, upon request, at any proceeding in which a right of the victim is at issue.
- 9. To a speedy trial and a prompt and final conclusion of the case and any related post-judgment proceedings.
- **10.** To provide information to a probation department official and any sentencing recommendations before the sentencing of the defendant.
- 11. To receive, upon request, the pre-sentence report when available to the defendant, except for those portions made confidential by law.
- 12. To be informed, upon request, of the conviction, sentence, place and time of incarceration, or other disposition of the defendant, the scheduled release date of the defendant, and the release of or the escape by the defendant from custody.
- 13. To restitution.
- **14.** To the prompt return of property when no longer needed as evidence.
- 15. To be informed of all parole procedures, to participate in the parole process, to provide information to the parole authority, to be considered before the parole of the offender, and to be notified, upon request, of the parole or other release of the offender.
- **16.** To have the safety of the victim, the victim's family, and the general public considered before any parole or other post-judgment release decision is made.
- 17. To be informed of the rights enumerated in paragraphs (1) through (16).



SEXUAL ASSAULT

Sexual assault committed by a stranger, acquaintance, family member, or significant other, including a spouse, is a crime.

If you have been the victim of a sexual assault, you have rights and privileges under the law.

- You have the right to have a victim advocate and/or support person present during law enforcement interviews.
- You have the right to request your name be kept confidential and exempt from public record disclosure.
- A police officer may not discourage you from receiving a medical or evidentiary examination (Sexual Assault Kit).
- A victim is not required to participate with the law enforcement investigation in order to receive the examination.
- Evidentiary exams are recommended within 120 hours of the incident. If a timely evidentiary examination is declined by the victim, evidence may be lost.
- No costs will be incurred by the victim(s) for the evidentiary examination.
- Minors 12 years and older may consent to an examination without parental consent.
- You have the right to have a counselor/advocate present during the examination.
- You have the right to follow up in writing and receive information about the results from the examination.
- The Sexual Assault Kit should be transported to the crime laboratory and tested within statutory time limits.
- The Sexual Assault Kit will be retained for at least 20 years. If you were under 18 at the time of the crime, the Sexual Assault Kit will be retained until your 40th birthday.
- You have the right to restitution if a criminal trial occurs.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

If you have been the victim of domestic violence, you have rights and privileges under the law.

- You have the right to make a citizen's arrest of the perpetrator as soon as circumstances permit and within a reasonable amount of time. A law enforcement officer has a duty to advise you of this right. You can elect to make a citizen's arrest at that time if the perpetrator is present.
- Domestic violence is a crime and law enforcement may make an arrest of your abuser even without your cooperation pursuant to CA Penal Code Section 13701(b).
- You have the right to file a civil suit for losses suffered as a result of abuse, including medical expenses, loss of earnings and other expenses incurred by you or by any agency that shelters you.

Be aware that despite the jailing of your attacker, that person may be released from jail at any time without your knowledge. You may register an e-mail address and/or telephone number(s) in order to be notified when an inmate is released, is pending release, or when transferred to a facility in another county or state prison. This service is called "Victim Information and Notification Everyday" or VINE. Call VINE toll-free at (877) 411-5588 or visit the Sheriff's website https://www.sdsheriff.net/victims/index.html

In strangulation cases, a Domestic Assault Forensic Examination (DAFE) is recommended. There is no charge to the victim for the DAFE. The investigating officer will schedule the DAFE on your behalf through Palomar Forensic Health Services.

EMERGENCY PROTECTIVE ORDERS

As the victim of Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, or any violent crime, you have the right to seek an Emergency Protective Order from the Officer, or you can go to the Superior Court and file a petition (court order) requesting any of the following orders for relief:

- Restraining your attacker from abusing you or any other family member
- ♦ Directing your attacker to leave your household
- Preventing your attacker from entering your residence, school, business or place of employment
- Awarding you or the other parent custody of, or visitation with, your minor child or children
- Restraining your attacker from molesting or interfering with minor children in your custody
- Directing the party not granted custody, to pay support of minor children, if that party has a legal obligation to do so
- Directing the defendant to make specified debit payments coming due while the order is in effect
- Directing either or both parties participate in counseling These orders can only be changed by order of the court, not by any action or inaction on your part.
