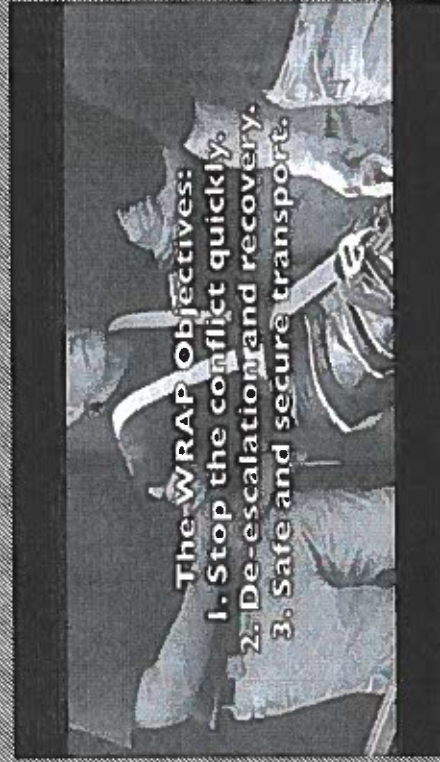
Policy and Procedure

1. **501.06 TYPE OF FORCE AUTHORIZED FOR USE.** Whenever officers are authorized to use force in the line of duty, the following types of force are approved:
 - a. Physical restraint of the person that forcibly restricts his/her freedom of movement.
 - b. The applications of a physical hold that inflict transitory pain when attempting to control a subject.
 - c. The use of the carotid restraint hold or chemical agent.
 - d. The weaponless striking of a person to control them to resist an attack or threat of physical violence upon the officer or another person.
 - e. The use of a baton, police canine, firearm, taser, handcuff, flexible baton ("bean bag") ammo, cord-cuff leg restraint, WRAP RESTRAINT SYSTEM, or other resource or tool authorized by the Department for such use. (Revised 9/2017)

Policy and Procedure

120.05 WRAP Restrained Prisoners. Prisoners secured in the WRAP restraint system will be transported in a seated position and belted into the vehicle. The prisoner will be positioned in the vehicle to allow the transporting officer the ability to maintain observation of the prisoner and monitor the condition, breathing, and level of consciousness of the prisoner. (Added 9/2017)

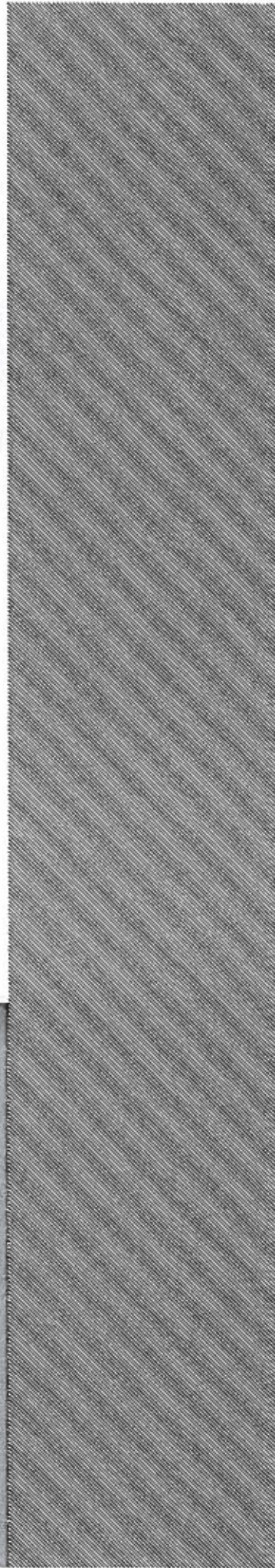


STEP 1

Control and handcuff the subject. Use techniques that do not restrict the subject's breathing.

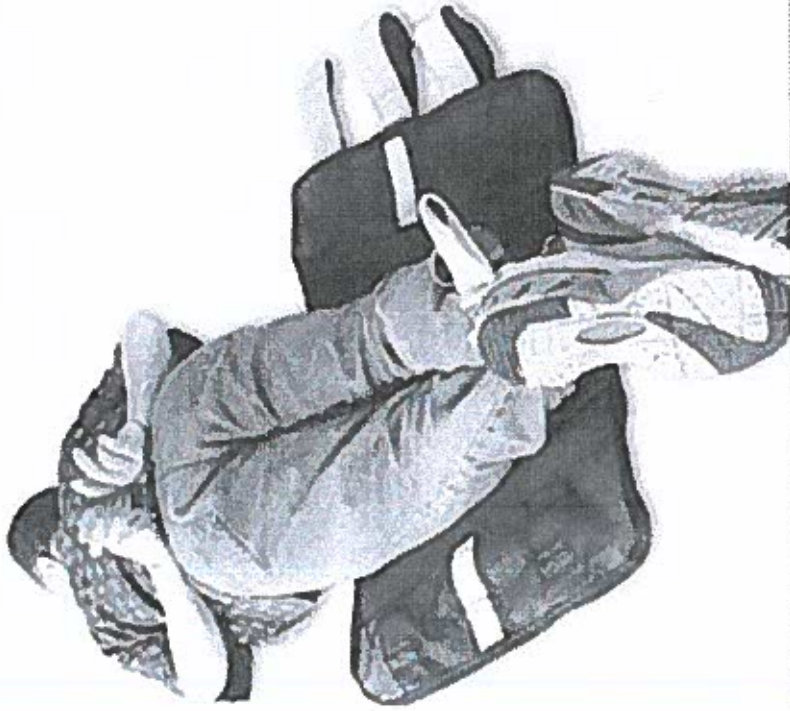

Secure subject's ankles with the hobble strap. Slide the leg portion of the WRAP under the subject's legs.



STEP 3

Quickly secure the leg bands. Locking the legs prevents the subject from kicking or escaping.



STEP 4

Apply harness,
securing a snug fit.
Then connect the
harness to the leg
restraint.



Subject is now fully restrained and can be moved or transported safely.

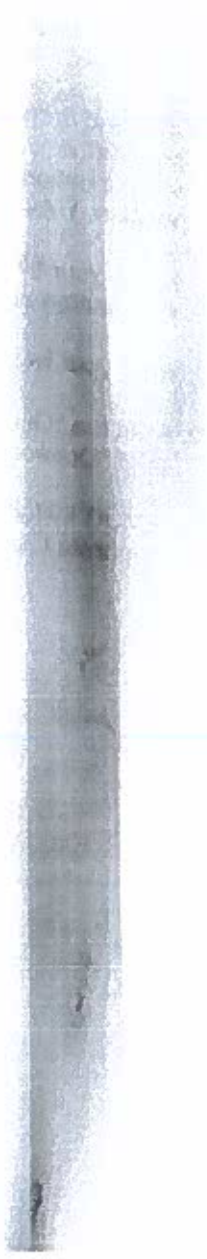
B. Call Photo - Steps to use with booking photos:

1. Sign into Cal Photo (Use you case number as reason for search of database).
2. Select Mugshot Search.
4. Enter the name and date of your suspect and select search.
4. Select you suspect's photo and choose a recent photo of suspect to use in you Photo Line-up.
5. Select "Add to Mugbook". Subsequently select "New Mugbook" and name your Mugbook (MB). (I use the case number for the name of the MB).
6. Select "Find similar" (Make sure suspect's demographics are same to include age range).
7. Select a Similar image and select: "Add to Mugbook" under the designated Mugbook name or case number. (You can initially select more than six subjects). You will a confirmation message in green on the upper right of your screen showing you that the photo was added to the Mugbook.
8. When you have ample subjects for your Mugbook to include the suspect, Select "Mugbook (near top left corner of webpage) and then selected the respective Mugbook.
9. Drag and drop suspect and five other subjects into Photo Line-up. (You can designate which location within the line-up you desire you suspect to be or you can select "Randomize"). Avoid placing suspect in the #1 Position.
10. Print your line-up by selecting "Print/Preview. Select "Print Six-Pack" You will get the Six-Pack photo line-up and a second photo Lineup with data (Names of all subjects in line-up).
11. Cal Photo does not include the Photographic Identification – Witness Admonishment similar to Cop Link. You will need an Oceanside Police Department "Photographic Identification – Witness Admonishment".

C. Call Photo - Steps when a California driver's license photo is available:

1. Sign into Cal Photo (Use case number as reason for search of database).
2. Select "DMV Search"
3. Enter the DL number of the suspect and first three letters of the suspect's last name and select search.

4. Select "Add to Mugbook". Subsequently select "New Mugbook" and name your Mugbook (MB). (I use the case number for the name of the MB).
5. Select "Find similar" (Make sure suspect's demographics are same to include age range).
6. Select a Similar image and select the blue highlighted DL number of the suspect. View the selected subjects photo to ensure it will work for your photo Line-up. If its good, select "Add to Mugbook" under the designated Mugbook name or case number. (You can initially select more than six subjects). You will a confirmation message in green on the upper right of your screen showing you that the photo was added to the Mugbook.
7. Repeat the process and when you have ample subjects for your Mugbook to include the suspect, Select "Mugbook (near top left corner of webpage) and then selected the respective Mugbook.
8. Drag and drop suspect and five other subjects into Photo Line-up. (You can designate which location within the line-up you desire you suspect to be or you can select "Randomize").
9. Print your line-up by selecting "Print/Preview. Select "Print Six-Pack" You will get the Six-Pack photo line-up and a second photo Lineup with data (Names of all subjects in line-up).
10. Cal Photo does not include the Photographic Identification – Witness Admonishment similar to Cop Link. You will need an Oceanside Police Department "Photographic Identification – Witness Admonishment".

D. COP Link (ARJIS):

1. Sign into COP Link (within the ARJIS database).
2. Enter the name and date of birth of your suspect and select find.
3. If COP Link contains a photo of your suspect, you will see a cartoon type emoji photo displayed next to the name of your suspect. Place cursor over the emoji and it will give you a glimpse of the suspect's photo. If the photo works for purposes of your Six-Pack, open that file.
4. Select "Create Photo- Lineup". Select "OK" to accept "Demographist only". The suspects photo will populate in the Six-Pack.
5. Drag and drop five other similar subjects into the Six-Pack from the right side of the screen. If you need additional subjects to select from, slide the tab near the bottom of the screen to the left and give it a few seconds to update. You can designate which location within the line-up you desire you suspect to be or you can select). Avoid placing suspect in the #1 Position.
6. Print your line-up by the file tab at eh top left corner of the page. Select "Print Output". Choose and export method (I prefer to save to my desktop as a PDF).
7. Right click on the Six-Pack file on your desktop and select "Open". Select "PDF-Xchange Viewer".
8. Print the Six-Pack. You will get the Six-Pack photo line-up and a printout with data
9. (Names and demographics of all subjects in line-up) and individual photos of all subjects.

10. Cop Link does not include the Photographic Identification – Witness Admonishment similar to SD Law's EMUG. You will need an Oceanside Police Department "Photographic Identification – Witness Admonishment".

E. EMUG (S.D. Law):

1. Sign into the San Diego Law website
2. Select the EMUG" tab as select "OK"
3. Select "Lineups"
4. Enter the name and date of birth of your suspect and select find (bottom right hand corner of page).
5. Find a recent and appropriate photo of your suspect and drag and drop in the Six-Pack just below it.
6. Ensure the designated photo is still selected and select "Similar Image Search" (just to the left of the photos.
7. Drag and drop five similar subjects into the Six-Pack. If you need additional subjects to select, hit the small arrow tab just below the photos on the right side of the screen. You can designate which location within the line-up you desire you suspect to be by dragging their photo to that position.). Avoid placing suspect in the #1 Position.
8. Name your Line-up within the "Description tab" (I typically use the case number) and select the save button at bottom of the page (it's the small photo of a memory disk below your Six-Pack).
9. Print your line-up by selecting the small photo of printer which is to the left of the save tab.
10. Print the "Oceanside PD (English) and the "Oceanside PD Lineup with data. If needed, you can print "Oceanside PD Lineup Sequential.
11. EMUG includes the Photographic Identification – Witness Admonishment . You will not a separate Oceanside Police Department "Photographic Identification – Witness Admonishment".

2650. Threatening a Public Official (Pen. Code, § 76)

The defendant is charged [in Count _____] with threatening a public official [in violation of Penal Code section 76].

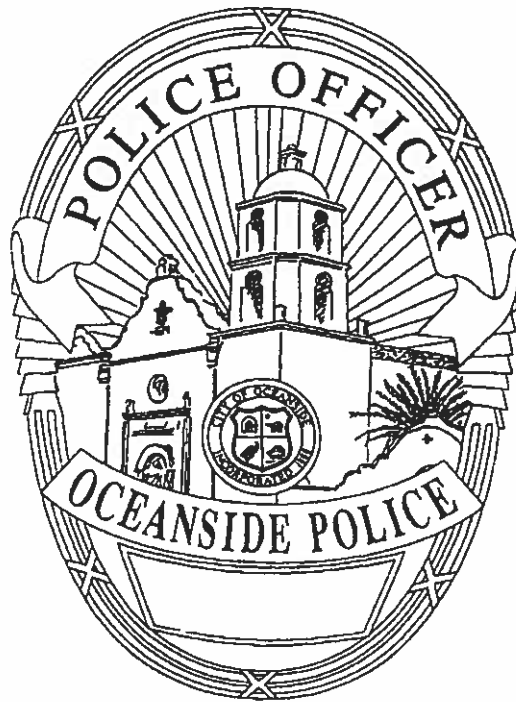

O.C. (Oleoresin Capsicum) Training

Policy and Procedures:

Volume I

505 Use of Oleoresin Capsicum (OC). It is the purpose of this policy to describe the circumstances where OC may be used and to regulate its use. (Refer to Vol. III, Section 501 for procedure.)

505.01 The regulations contained in this policy, and the use of OC herein authorized, comprise the limitations established by DOJ and the Chief of Police. Any member who exceeds these limitations or fails to comply with these regulations shall be subject to disciplinary action unless that member can adequately justify the action taken was legal, safe, and reasonable. The burden of such justification shall be on the member.

505.02 Type of Chemical Agent Authorized. OC shall be the only chemical agent herein authorized for carry and use by authorized members of this department. Specific brands and hand-held applicators shall only be those authorized by DOJ and issued by this department.

505.03 Authorized Use. OC will only be used when reasonable and lawful. (Revised 11/98)

505.03.1 OC will not be used on a person once he/she is secured and properly under control.

Volume III

501 Use of Oleoresin Capsicum (OC).

501.01 Precautions. The following precautions shall be strictly adhered to with regard to the application of OC:

- a. OC should be used for officers' defensive purposes and overcoming resistance by hostile subjects
- b. OC should not be used in the immediate vicinity of infants since their respiratory systems are extremely sensitive.
- c. Caution should be used prior to using OC on resisting suspects who engaged physically with other officers or who are not isolated from bystanders. This may be facilitated by giving a verbal notification, such as "GAS", and its acknowledgment by involved members prior to application.
- d. Care should be given before using OC in windy conditions.
- e. OC applicators should be shaken once a month to ensure that the active ingredient is properly mixed
- f. Care should be taken as to the type of applicator and its mode of carry to preclude accidental discharge.
- g. OC contains flammable carriers and should not be used where exposure to open flame or spark (TASER devices) may cause ignition.
- h. Officers should recognize the limitations of OC especially in situations in which attackers are armed.

501.02 First Aid. First aid provided in conjunction with the use of OC should always be administered as soon as possible and thoroughly documented in the Officer's Report on the incident.

501.02.1 Flush the area with water as soon as possible, which will reduce the symptoms and cause the agent to dissipate. To further facilitate recovery, a damp cloth may be used to blot (only) the agent from the affected area. Attackers are to be kept under direct observation until symptoms dissipate.



501.02.2 All symptoms should disappear within 15-45 minutes without after effects. Should the symptoms persist beyond this time limit, medical attention should be obtained as soon as possible and prior to booking.

501.03 Reporting. In all incidents involving the deployment of OC, the following reporting requirements will be completed.

- a. Supervisor will be notified from the scene and respond to the scene. (Added 01/2007)
- b. If a person is booked after being subjected to OC, that information will be noted on the booking slip and the jail will be notified of that fact.
- c. Members who are contaminated by OC, and who require medical treatment, will complete the standard IOD form.
- d. The Arrest Report will contain a notation that OC was utilized and a notation of the time first aid was provided.
- e. If the circumstances do not permit the identification or arrest of subject(s) involved, the fact that OC was utilized will be documented in the major incident report, or in an incident report if a major incident report is not made.

502.07 Medical Treatment. First aid provided in conjunction with the use of OC should be administered as soon as possible and thoroughly documented in the officer's report on the incident. (Added 02/01)

502.07.1 Flush the area with water as soon as possible, to reduce the symptoms and cause the agent to dissipate. To further facilitate recovery, a damp cloth may be used to blot (only) the agent from the affected area. Attackers are to be kept under direct observation until symptoms dissipate. (Added 02/01)

502.07.2 All symptoms should disappear within 15-45 minutes without after effects. Should the symptoms persist beyond this time limit, medical attention should be obtained as soon as possible and prior to booking. (Added 02/01)

502.08 Reporting Requirements. In all incidents involving the deployment of OC, the following reporting requirements will be completed.

- a. Supervisor will be notified from the scene and respond to the scene. (Added 01/2007)
- b. A person booked after being subjected to OC, that information will be noted on the booking slip and the jail will be notified.
- c. Members contaminated by OC, and require medical treatment, will complete the IOD form.
- d. The Arrest Report will contain a notation that OC was used and note the time first aid was provided.
- e. If the circumstances do not permit the identification or arrest of subject(s) involved, the fact that OC was utilized will be documented in the major incident report, or in an incident report if a major incident report is not made. (Added 02/01)



Individual Responsibilities (Chemical Agent Instructor handbook, 2009):

- 1.) Have a thorough knowledge of chemical agents, its effects, and chemical agent weapons. Use these tools prudently.
- 2.) Use only that force which is reasonable
- 3.) Maintain order, but never attempt to punish with chemical agents
- 4.) Respect both private and public property at all times when deploying chemical agents.
- 5.) Every reasonable effort at diffusing a situation should be considered before deploying chemical agents.
- 6.) Use chemical agents in a progressive escalation of weaponry.
- 7.) Do not use chemical agents to quell verbal attacks.
- 8.) Never use on an already controlled prisoner.

"Chemical agents are more humane than a handgun, shotgun, or baton, and have been instrumental in saving many lives, of both suspect and peace officers."



OC is an aerosol irritant and a viable force option...but can be ineffective.

Multiple doses found to be no more effective than initial dose. (1994, Tallahassee PD)

OC should be considered a non-lethal force option, but there have been arrestees who have died after being sprayed. In a 1994 study (IACP) of 30 in-custody deaths, OC was never listed as the cause of death in any of the cases. Most deaths occurred immediately or soon after the confrontation. Positional asphyxia was the primary cause in most cases. Alcohol and/or drugs were a factor in most cases.

Be aware of wind, crowds and others who may be cross-contaminated.

0.5 - 1 second bursts across eyes...on forehead, nose & mouth if glasses are worn.
Minimum standoff is 3 feet.

Less effective on people under the influence or mentally ill

Decontamination: Fresh air, Water, Soap

Notify supervisor ASAP

Call OFD and closely monitor the subject

Use the recovery position...avoid positional asphyxiation

Document the who, what, when, where, WHY and how

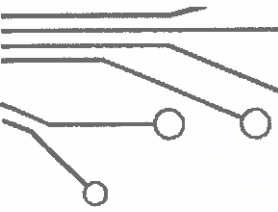

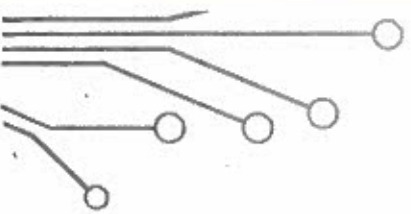
AB 109

- Realignment of Prison System due to State overcrowding
- 60,000 inmates in state prison reduced to about 35,000 new inmates annually in state prison.
- This correlates to about a 17% total reduction in prison population.
- Redirects up to \$1 billion in funds from the state system to county levels.



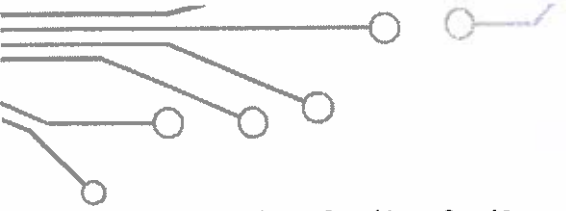
THE IMPACT ON LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

- Increased amount of 'prison bodies' in local system.
- State law automatically credits inmates with 50% good time.
- So a 'county year' is 6 months.
- Local sentences are served out in jails faster than prison.



DOCUMENTING GANG ACTIVITY

- Self admitted gang member or if two or more of the following criteria apply, one of which occurred within the previous 5 years;
- Subject has tattoos identifying a specific gang.
- Subject frequents an area notorious for gangs and/or associates with known gang members documented

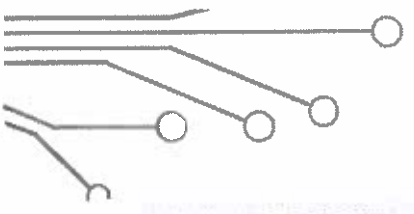
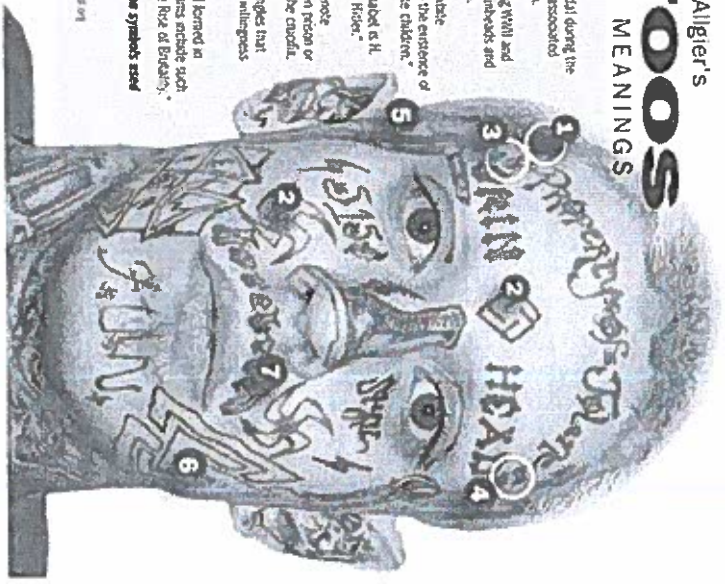

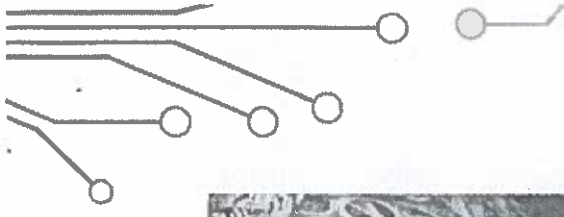


Curtis Allier's TATTOOS AND THEIR MEANINGS

- 1 Iron cross: Designated as a medal during the Napoleonic Wars, has become associated with Nazi Germany's Third Reich.
- 2 Swastika: Used by Nazis during WWII and adopted by neo-Nazis, Jews, skinheads and other white supremacist groups.
- 3 14: 14 and 14th are signs of white supremacists. "The man secures the entrance of our people and a future for white children."
- 4 He: The eighth letter of the alphabet is H. Hit represents the phrase "Heil Hitler."
- 5 Sketched warlike man: Can denote someone who has served time in prison or committed murder. Taken on the crucial.
- 6 Wskocic: Have interesting meanings that symbolize the hope and/or a willingness to sacrifice your life.
- 7 Malheur: A heavy metal band formed in Connecticut in 1993. Their albums include such titles as "Supremacy" and "The Rise of Brutality".

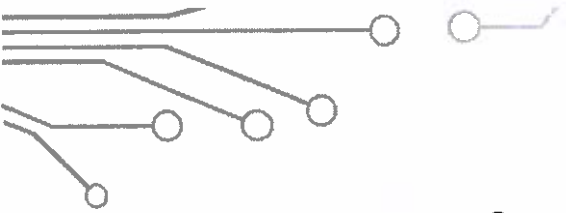

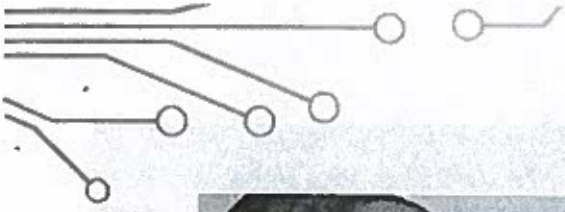


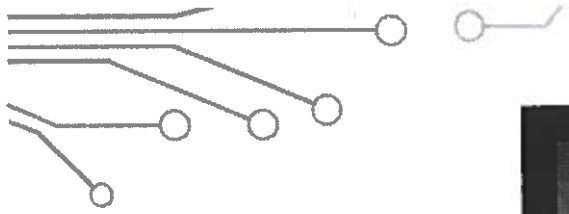


HISPANIC GANGS

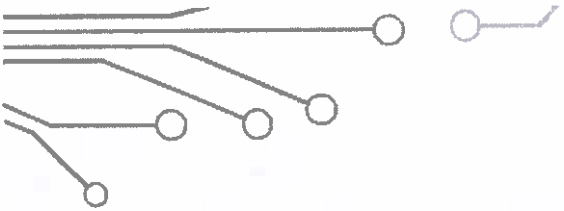

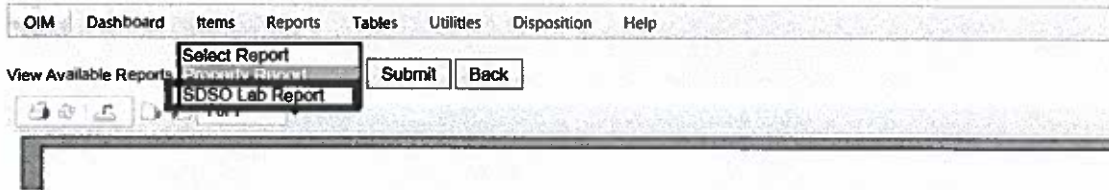

TRANSPORT OF INJURED OFFICERS VIA PATROL CAR

With the increased frequency of officer deaths (**34 This Year 163 Last Year ODMF.com**) and injuries by gunfire as well as the more frequent Active Shooter Threat, it is important that we review several factors to consider when deciding whether or not to transport an injured officer via patrol car post incident. Each situation is context dependent and will need to be evaluated based on the situation at hand. This is not a checklist but consider the following factors when making your decision:

Evaluate the officer's injuries and immediately begin tactical emergency casualty care (TECC)

- Conduct a wound sweep
- Stop life threatening external bleeding.
- Limbs – tourniquet application (high on the limb)
- Mid-section- chest seal(s) application
- Evaluate transport options
- There should be trauma kits located in the rear of each patrol vehicle and should contain Compression bandages, a tourniquet and QuickClot Combat Gauze.

How close is FD?

- If FD Medics are staged nearby consider driving out of the hot zone and to the medic's staging area for transfer.
- If the scene is code 4 and medics are staged, it will be clear for them to enter and transport the injured officer.

How close is TCMC?

- TCMC is not a trauma center and not the only option that should be evaluated for transport via patrol car. Remember, Officers with severe injuries will need a trauma center.
- If you drive to Scripps in La Jolla it is a 30-minute drive without traffic.
- Consider Palomar Hospital as an option – this is a trauma center
- A major consideration is the time of day due to traffic on SR-78.

How close is the Oceanside Airport?

- Consider driving out of the hot zone to Oceanside Airport and direct medics to meet you there.
- Once there, medics can give a higher level of care than we can provide prior to transport by REACH.

-
- If you transport to a hospital, have dispatch advise the hospital that you are enroute so they are waiting for your arrival.
 - Whichever option you utilize, provide TECC while waiting for OFD or in the back of the patrol vehicle while evacuating the injured officer.

As a reminder, do not park in the middle of the roadway during a critical incident. Pull your patrol vehicle off to the side and leave room for follow on vehicles that will need rapid access to the scene.

Parking issues are a common occurrence during these events and lead to serious problems such as fire and armor unable to reach the crisis site.

It is recommended to remove the firearm and ammo from an incapacitated officer and properly secure it before medical staff gets involved.

102.09 Emergency Medical Care. Members shall summon paramedics should a prisoner be or become so injured or ill that the prisoner's health may be in jeopardy. (Revised 02/00)

101.13 Injured Persons. A sergeant will be notified immediately if a prisoner is injured. If the prisoner was injured before the arrest, the sergeant may order the prisoner booked, released O.R., or released pending a long form complaint. The sergeant should keep in mind the need for custody vs. the cost of hospital treatment. If the prisoner is released, s/he should be directed to seek his/her own medical treatment.

Fight in progress call

- 2105 hours, a call of a fight to the rear of the Red Rooster is broadcast, involving a staff member and a transient. While enroute, the staff member drags the transient into the business, and dispatch hears a gunshot during a 911 call.

- Staff are not saying anything to dispatch, but a man's voice is heard saying, "Who's next?" and the line goes dead.

- When officers arrive, and prepare to contact, another gunshot is heard and a subject flees out of the business and over the fence, where he crosses the railroad tracks toward approximately 5 transients at the stop.

- Approximately 10 people flee out of the business, and a bartender is debriefed telling officers that two males remain inside. He is unsure if the armed suspect is still inside the business or is one of the two people still inside.
